Objective

To assess the effectiveness of the educational TV show "Akili and Me" as an intervention in northern Nigeria during the COVID-19 pandemic.

To understand how children's learning outcomes were affected during school closures.



Participants

Number: 363 children from Northern Nigeria who provided data at baseline and completed the intervention.

Location: Northern Nigeria



Methodology



Type:

Quasi-experimental intervention adapted to a naturalistic setting due to the pandemic.

Procedure:

Baseline data collection followed by follow-up assessments after exposure to Akili and Me.

Duration:

During COVID-19 pandemic school closures.

Shape Recognition

Results - Improvements in Measured Areas:



- 1. Children who could identify more characters from "Akili and Me" showed enhanced performance in literacy, numeracy, and socio-emotional skills.
- 2. During crises, educational media proved to be an essential tool for supporting home learning when traditional schooling is interrupted.



Conclusion

- 1. Educational media, specifically animated programs like *Akili and Me* can effectively teach vulnerable preschool children important socio-emotional and health content.
- 2. This study contributes to the literature on educational media by demonstrating its potential impact on young children's development.



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
